COPPER IN SEPTEMBER 2012

Mine production in the first 9 months of 2012 increased by about 4% from that in the same period of 2011 as production increases in Arizona, Nevada, and New Mexico were partially offset by a decline in Utah, where production at the Bingham Canyon Mine was 30% lower than that in the first 9 months of 2011. Freeport-McMoRan Copper & Gold Inc. reported that production at its Arizona mines in the first 9 months of 2012 increased by about 3% to 414,000 metric tons (t), and production at its mines in New Mexico increased by 58% to 73,000 t (Freeport-McMoRan Copper & Gold Inc., 2012, p. 14; Rio Tinto plc, 2012, p. 3).

Although smelter production in the third quarter of 2012 increased by 55% from that in the second quarter, production in the first 9 months of 2012 was 13% less than that in the same period of 2011. Downstream electrolytic production of refined copper for the first 9 months of 2012 was 12% lower than in the same period of 2011. The decline in electrolytic production was partially offset by an increase in electrowon production, and

total refined production for the first 9 months of 2012 was only about 4% lower than in the same period of 2011. Consumption of refined copper in the first 9 months of 2012 was up slightly from that in the same period of 2011, and net imports of refined copper were 40% less than those in the same period of 2011, primarily owing to a surge in exports to 150,000 t from 26,500 t in 2011. The decline in net imports was accompanied by a 221,000-t decrease in U.S. refined copper inventories during the first 9 months of 2012.
