IRON ORE IN APRIL 1970

Iron ore shipments increased in April, with the start of the Great Lakes shipping season, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Shipments totaled 5.3 million long tons, an increase from the 2.3 million tons in March. Domestic production was 6.6 million tons, compared with 5.8 million tons in March. Mine stocks of marketable ore on April 30 were 23.6 million tons, an increase from the 22.3 million tons on March 31.

U.S. exports of iron ore in April were 339,000 long tons. Japan and Canada obtained the bulk of the exports, with Japan acquiring 74 percent of the total. U.S. imports for consumption in April totaled 2.9 million long tons, valued at \$30.6 million. Venezuela and Canada were the major suppliers, accounting for 40 percent and 39 percent of the total, respectively. The average declared value per ton was \$10.38.
