## IRON ORE IN NOVEMBER 1970

Domestic production and shipments of iron ore in November declined by 27.5 percent and 29.4 percent, respectively, compared with the previous month, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. The declines were generated mainly by a seasonal drop of about 33 percent in output and shipments from the Lake Superior region. Total stocks of iron ore at the Nation's mines declined 6.1 percent during November, while total stocks at consuming centers were virtually unchanged from the previous month.

Imports of iron ore for consumption were about 400,000 tons less than in October. Imports for the first 11 months of 1970 totaled 41.7 million tons, an increase of 5 million tons over the corresponding period of 1969. Fifty-three percent of 1970 imports came from Canada.

In December, a Lake County, Minn. district court ruled in favor of Reserve Mining Co. in its suit contesting the validity of an allegation by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MCPA) that the company's Silver Bay concentrator was causing excessive pollution of Lake Superior by fine taconite tailings. The decision made no ruling on whether the tailings were polluting the lake, but it called for the company and MCPA to agree on an alternative method of tailings disposal by May 15, 1971, and for the company to install approved modifications of its disposal system by May 15, 1973. The Silver Bay plant's discharge of tailings was reported to be about 60,000 tons daily.

Closing of the Tracy underground mine at Negaunee, Michigan by the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. was reported on January 13, 1971. Reasons for the closure were stated to be rising costs of underground mining, and difficulties in blending Tracy ore with other ores used by the company. The mine produced a soft hematite ore, graded as low-phosphorus non-bessemer, at the rate of more than 500,000 tons annually. About 275 miners will be affected by the shutdown, which leaves only one underground mine -- the Mather mine of Cleveland Cliffs Iron Co. -- still operating on the Marquette Range.
