## IRON ORE IN SEPTEMBER 1972

U.S. mine production of iron ore continued to increase in September although shipments were less than in the previous month, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Cumulative production and shipments in 1972 still lagged behind the levels of 1971, but difference between the 2 years in September was considerably less than in June. By the end of September, consumption of iron ore was 2.6 percent more than in the first 9 months of 1971. Stocks of ore at the mines were about 1.8 million tons greater than 1 year ago, but stocks at consuming plants were about 8 million tons less. Imports of iron ore during the first 9 months were 21.5 percent less than in 1971.

In Minnesota, expansion of the Minntac taconite facility by U.S. Steel Corp. was essentially completed and production of pellets in the new agglomerator sections was underway. The expansion increased productive capacity at Minntac to 12 million tons of pellets per year. Elsewhere on the Mesabi range, Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. completed production and shipments of natural ores for the 1972 season on September 18, and began winter stripping operations at the McKinley, Hill Annex, and Lind-Greenway mines.

On the Great Lakes, six companies were planning to continue ore shipments beyond normal closing dates for the season. U.S. Steel Corp. announced plans to continue shipping into February, if possible.

In Canada, iron ore production and shipments from Labrador and northern Quebec were returning to normal as the strike affecting Iron Ore Co. of Canada operations at Labrador City and Schefferville was settled on September 12. Earlier, settlements had been reached by Quebec Cartier Mining Co. at Gagnon and by Wabush Mines at Wabush. In British Columbia, production of iron ore from the Wesfrob mine, owned by Falconbridge Nickel Mines, Ltd., was expected to resume; production had been stopped in July due to full stockpiles resulting from the Japanese shipping strike.
