## IRON ORE IN MAY 1981

U.S. mine shipments of iron ore in May were more than twice the quantity shipped in April, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Exports and imports of iron ore also increased. At the end of May, U.S. consumption of iron ore in 1981 was slightly more than at the corresponding date 1 year earlier, but 1981 mine shipments, exports, and imports remained below those of the previous year.

Two new self-unloading ore carriers began service on the Great Lakes in May. The 1,013-foot  $\underline{\text{William J. DeLancey}}$ , operated by Interlake Steamship Co., received its first cargo of iron ore pellets at Silver Bay, Minn. on May 12. The 1,000-foot  $\underline{\text{Columbia Star}}$ , of the Columbia Transportation division of Oglebay Norton Co., received its first cargo of pellets at the same port on June 1.

United States Steel Corp. increased the price of Mesabi non-Bessemer ore, basis 51.5% iron, natural, delivered rail-of-vessel at lower lake ports, to \$32.53 per gross ton, effective June 13, 1981. The new price was about 14% higher than that quoted previously.
