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Iron and Steel Scrap, Monthly

IRON AND STEEL SCRAP IN SEPTEMBER 1978

Returns from 73% of reporting consumers representing 91% of total scrap consumption, indicated that consumption of iron and steel scrap in September on a daily average basis was 4% above that in August, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of Interior. Compared with August data, daily average production and net receipts were unchanged and down 2%, respectively, and stocks at the end of the month were down 2%.

Exports of ferrous scrap during the month were 7% above those for August 1978 and 46% above those for September 1977. Japan was the largest importer of U.S. scrap in September 1978, taking 41% of the total exported. The next largest importers were Italy and Spain, which received 13% and 9%, respectively.

The Iron Age composite price for No. 1 heavy melting steel scrap (Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia) at the end of September was \$72.83 per long ton, up 26% from the price of \$57.83 at the end of September 1977.

Pig iron production and consumption on a daily average basis for the month were up 1% and 2%, respectively, from those of the previous month. Monthend stocks of pig iron decreased 3% compared with those at the end of August.

FOREIGN TRADE

Exports of iron and steel scrap totaled 834,347 short tons in September compared with 776,736 tons in August. Exports of pig iron during September totaled 893 tons and 6,552 tons in August. Imports of scrap totaled 70,428 short tons in September compared with 71,209 tons in August. Of the scrap imported during September 65,917 short tons came from Canada and 4,511 tons from other sources. Imports of pig iron totaled 87,743 short tons in September and 77,985 tons in August. In addition to the foregoing imports of pig iron during September, there were 99 tons of sponge iron, valued at \$31,592 imported, all of which came from Canada.
