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Iron and Steel Scrap, Monthly

IRON AND STEEL SCRAP IN OCTOBER 1979

Returns from 70% of reporting consumers representing 94% of total scrap consumption, indicated that consumption of iron and steel scrap in October on a daily average basis was 3% above that in September, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Compared with September data, daily average production and net receipts were up 4% and 5%, respectively, and stocks at the end of the month were up 1%.

Exports of ferrous scrap during the month were 29% above those for September 1979 and 5% below those for October 1978. Japan was the principal country of destination, accounting for 29% of the total exported in October 1979, followed by Italy and Mexico, with 14% and 11%, respectively.

The Iron Age composite price for No. 1 heavy melting steel scrap (Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia) at the end of October was \$88.83 per long ton, up 9% from the price of \$81.17 at the end of October 1978.

Pig iron production and consumption on a daily average basis during the month were down 5% and 2%, respectively, from those of the previous month. Stocks of pig iron decreased 1% during October compared with those at the end of September 1979.

FOREIGN TRADE

Exports of iron and steel scrap totaled 925,713 short tons in October compared with 716,850 tons in September. Exports of pig iron during October totaled 1,535 tons and 7,029 tons in September. Imports of scrap totaled 50,084 short tons in October compared with 47,468 tons in September. Of the scrap imported during October, 47,682 short tons came from Canada and 2,402 tons from other sources. Imports of pig iron totaled 10,413 short tons in October and 38,734 tons in September. In addition to the foregoing imports of pig iron during October, there were 3 tons of sponge iron, valued at \$2,651, imported from Canada.
