## IRON AND STEEL SCRAP IN FEBRUARY 1980

Returns from 68% of reporting consumers representing 92% of total scrap consumption, indicated that consumption of iron and steel scrap in February on a daily average basis was 4% above that in January, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Compared with January data, daily average production and net receipts were up 4% and 6% respectively, and stocks at the end of the month were down 4%.

Exports of ferrous scrap during the month were 13% below those for January, 1980 and 13% below those for February, 1979. Japan was the principal country of destination, accounting for 22% of the total exported in February 1980, followed by Italy and Spain, with 19% and 13% respectively.

The Iron Age composite price for No. 1 heavy melting steel scrap (Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia) at the end of February was \$104.50 per ton, down 9% from the price of \$114.83 at the end of February 1979.

Pig iron production and consumption on a daily average basis during the month were both up 3% from those of the previous month. Stocks of pig iron were down 3% during February compared with those at the end of January 1980.

FOREIGN TRADE

Exports of iron and steel scrap totaled 992,324 short tons in February compared with 1,139,063 tons in January. Exports of pig iron during February totaled 864 tons and 1,908 tons in January. Imports of scrap totaled 70,000 short tons in February compared with 49,720 tons in January. Of the scrap imported during February 60,000 short tons came from Canada and 10,000 tons from other sources. Imports of pig iron totaled 27,166 short tons in February and 5,492 tons in January.
