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Iron and Steel Scrap, Monthly

IRON AND STEEL SCRAP IN AUGUST 1982

Returns from 60% of reporting consumers representing 82% of total scrap consumption, indicated that consumption of iron and steel scrap on a daily average basis remained virtually the same as that in July, according to the Bureau of Mines, U.S. Department of the Interior. Compared with July data, daily average production was down 2%; net receipts were up 5%; and stocks at the end of the month were down 3%.

Exports of ferrous scrap during the month were 6% below those for July 1982. The Republic of Korea was the principal country of destination, accounting for 30% of the total exports in August 1982, followed by Japan with 22% and India with 9%.

On a daily average basis, pig iron production was down 7% and consumption was down 6% compared with that of the previous month. Stocks of pig iron at monthend were down 4% compared with those at the end of July 1982.

Comparative monthly composite prices in dollars a long ton for No. 1 heavy melting steel scrap as quoted by two sources are shown:

FOREIGN TRADE

Exports of iron and steel scrap totaled 542,446 short tons in August compared with 576,966 tons in July. Exports of pig iron during August totaled 985 tons and 711 tons in July. Imports of scrap totaled 44,016 short tons in August compared with 36,440 tons in July. Of the scrap imported during August, 38,829 short tons came from Canada and 5,187 tons from other sources. Imports of pig iron totaled 14,812 short tons in August and 8,681 tons in July. In addition to the foregoing imports of pig iron during August, there were 66 tons of sponge and powdered iron, valued at \$25,709 imported, practically all of which came from Canada.
