# **MAGNESIUM IN THE THIRD QUARTER 2014**

U.S. magnesium exports in the first three quarters of 2014 were essentially the same as exports in the first three quarters of 2013. Mexico (39%), Canada (19%), Brazil (17%), and Singapore (15%) were the principal destinations. Exports of metal and semifabricated products decreased by 6% and 25%, respectively, while exports of alloys increased slightly and those of waste and scrap more than doubled. Magnesium imports for consumption in the first three quarters of 2014 were 20% more than imports in the first three quarters of 2013. Israel was the source of 71% of imported magnesium metal. Scrap accounted for 37% of the total third quarter 2014 imports, 48% of which came from Canada, and 20% came from Mexico.

# **Update**

The Platts Metals Week quoted U.S. magnesium price range and U.S. dealer spot prices for imported magnesium (table 2)

were unchanged during the third quarter of 2014. Prices for magnesium in China and Europe decreased slightly. Continuing stagnant demand in export markets and abundant supplies in China contributed to the price declines in China and Europe (Yee, 2014).
