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## TIN IN NOVEMBER 2015

Domestic reported consumption of primary tin in November 2015 was 1,920 metric tons (t), 4% less than that in October 2015 and slightly less than that in November 2014. Total refined tin imports for November were 2,800 t, a decrease of 5% from October 2015. Malaysia, Indonesia, Peru, Bolivia, and Brazil were, in descending order by tonnage, the leading sources of refined tin imports in November (table 4).

The Platts Metals Week average New York dealer price of Grade A tin for November was \$6.95 per pound, a decrease of 7% from the October price of \$7.46 per pound and a decrease of 26% from the November 2014 average price of \$9.36 per pound (table 2).

The Mawchi tin and tungsten mines in Burma restarted in November after heavy rains caused a landslide in the surrounding residential areas in October killing 28 people. Operations at the mines were suspended to look for survivors and as a precautionary measure against other landslides (Dragomanovich, 2015a).

Based on a survey of 148 companies that accounted for approximately 50% of the world's consumption of refined tin, ITRI Ltd. estimated that refined tin use declined by 3% in 2015 owing mostly to a 6% decrease in consumption by solder manufacturers in China. Production was estimated to have decreased by 8%, resulting in a production-to-consumption deficit of 6,000 t (Dragomanovich, 2015b; ITRI Ltd., 2015).
