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TIN IN MARCH 2021

Domestic reported consumption of primary refined tin in March 2021 was 1,510 metric tons (t), an 8% decrease from that in February 2021 and a 13% decrease from that in March 2020. In the first quarter of 2021, domestic reported consumption of primary refined tin was 4,850 t, a 5% decrease from that of the same period of 2020. Apparent consumption of refined tin in March 2021 was 5,140 t, a 53% increase from that in February 2021, and a 22% increase from that in March 2020. The increase in apparent consumption was driven by low inventory and increased imports. In the first quarter of 2021, apparent consumption of refined tin was 11,500 t, a 5% decrease from that of the same period of 2020 (table 1).

Prices

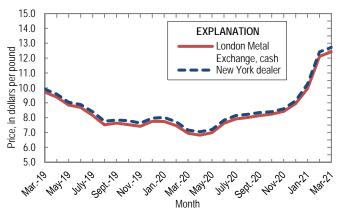


Figure 1. Average monthly prices for Grade A tin from March 2019 through March 2021. Source: S&P Global Platts Metals Week.

The S&P Global Platts Metals Week average New York dealer price of Grade A tin for March 2021 was \$12.73 per pound, a 3% increase from that in February 2021, and a 78% increase from that in March 2020. The average London Metal Exchange (LME) cash price of Grade A tin for March 2021 was \$12.43 per pound, a 3% increase from that in February 2021, and a 79% increase from that in March 2020 (fig. 1, table 2). Monthly tin price averages for both exchanges continue at their highest levels since May 2011. Supply shortfall, dwindling stocks, and high demand from all the traditional tin consuming sectors have led to a nearly ten-year high in tin prices (Hunter, 2021).

U.S. Trade

Total refined tin imports in March 2021 were 4,400 t, a 71% increase from those in February 2021, and a 30% increase from those in March 2020. The leading sources of refined tin in March 2021 were Peru (27%), Bolivia (22%), Malaysia (19%), Indonesia (18%), and Brazil (5%). In the first quarter of 2021, refined tin imports were 9,240 t, a 4% decrease from those in the same period of 2020. In the first quarter of 2021, leading sources of refined tin were Peru (34%), Bolivia (23%), Indonesia (15%), Malaysia (11%) and Brazil (10%). Total refined tin exports in March were 123 t, an increase of 45 t from those in February 2021. In the first quarter of 2021, refined tin

exports were 326 t, an increase of 207 t from that of the same period of 2020 (table 4).

Update

In March, the Defense Logistics Agency announced that it would offer for sale, 40 t of stock-piled tin. The tin appears weathered, apparently suffering from tin-disease or tin-pest, which may require additional refining or to be supplemented with pure tin when consumed in manufacturing (O'Sullivan, 2021).
